

**CHAPTER cxv.**

An Act to confirm certain Provisional Orders made by the Board of Trade under the General Pier and Harbour Act, 1861, relating to Ardglass, Boddam, Lochmaddy, Montrose, Southsea, and Youghal. A.D. 1878.
[4th July 1878.]

WHEREAS a Provisional Order made by the Board of Trade under the General Pier and Harbour Act, 1861, is not of any validity or force whatever until the confirmation thereof by Act of Parliament: 24 & 25 Vict.
c. 45.

And whereas it is expedient that the several Provisional Orders made by the Board of Trade under the said Act, and set out in the schedule to this Act, be confirmed by Act of Parliament:

Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1. The several Orders set out in the schedule to this Act shall be and the same are hereby confirmed; and all the provisions thereof, in manner and form as they are set out in the said schedule, shall, from and after the passing of this Act, have full validity and force. Confirma-

2. This Act may be cited as the Pier and Harbour Orders Confirmation Act, 1878 (No. 2). Short title.

ARDGLASS DOCK.

*Order for the repair, maintenance, and regulation of a Dock at
Ardglass in the county of Down.*

- Undertakers. 1. Aubrey de Vere Beauclerk, Esquire, of Ardglass in the county of Down, his heirs, assigns, and successors, shall be the Undertakers for carrying this Order into execution.
- Incorporation of Lands Clauses Acts. 2. The Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts, 1845, 1860, and 1869, (except so much thereof as relates to the purchase and taking of lands otherwise than by agreement,) shall be incorporated with this Order.
- Limits. 3. The limits within which the Undertakers shall have authority, and which shall be deemed the limits to which this Order and the power to levy rates extend, shall comprise the inside dock described in section 4 of the Ardglass Harbour Act, 1876.
- Description of works. 4. Subject to the provisions of this Order, the Undertakers may execute and maintain the works authorised by this Order.
- Works authorised. 5. The works authorised by this Order comprise :—
 - (1.) Repairing, deepening, and maintaining the before-mentioned inside dock, and repairing and maintaining the quay wall round the same;
 - (2.) Dredging, scouring, widening, deepening, enlarging, improving, and maintaining the entrance to the dock;
 - (3.) The erection of such mooring posts as may be necessary.
Provided that the works authorised by this section below high-water mark shall not be commenced without the assent of the Board of Trade having been first obtained in writing.
- Power to take rates according to schedule. 6. When a certificate has been obtained from the Board of Trade that all consents and approvals on the part of the Board of Trade required under this

For each ton of goods of forty cubic feet, or for each ton of goods of twenty cwt., which shall remain in the sheds or on the pier or other works for a longer time than forty-eight hours the sum of 3*d.*, and the sum of 1½*d.* per ton for each day during which such goods shall remain after first forty-eight hours.

MONTROSE.

Order for amending the Acts relating to the Harbour of Montrose, and for conferring further Powers on the Trustees of that Harbour.

Short title.
Order to be read with Harbour Acts.

1. This Order may be cited as the Montrose Harbour Order, 1878, and shall be construed with the Montrose Harbour Act, 1837, in this Order called "the Act of 1837," the Montrose Harbour Act, 1850, in this Order called "the Act of 1850," and the Montrose Harbour Act, 1866, in this Order called "the Act of 1866," all of which three Acts are in this Order called "the Harbour Acts;" and this Order and the Harbour Acts as amended and varied by this Order shall be read and construed together as one Act, and may be cited collectively as the Montrose Harbour Acts and Order, 1837-1878.

2. From and after the passing of the Act confirming this Order, sections three, four, and five, and sections nineteen to twenty-three, both inclusive; sections twenty-six to thirty-nine, both inclusive; sections forty-two, forty-three, forty-four, forty-seven, fifty-three, and fifty-five; and sections sixty-five to eighty, both inclusive; and sections ninety-six and one hundred and thirteen of the Act of 1837; sections thirty-four, thirty-nine, forty, forty-two, forty-three, forty-seven, forty-eight, and fifty-two of the Act of 1850; and sections five to twenty-three, both inclusive; and sections twenty-six, twenty-seven, thirty, and thirty-five of the Act of 1866 shall be and the same sections are hereby repealed.

3. On and after the date or dates on which the trustees in office at the passing of the Act confirming this Order shall go out of office the twenty-three persons to be elected annually as trustees shall be the following; viz., the provost and eldest bailie of the burgh of Montrose for the time, *ex officio*, and two other of the members of the town council of the said burgh to be elected by the town council of the said burgh; nine merchants or shipowners, municipal electors of the said burgh, to be elected by the municipal electors of the said burgh, these nine trustees being also called in this Order "the municipal trustees;" five persons being commissioners of supply of the county of Forfar, to be elected by the said county; four persons to be elected by the magistrates and town council of the city of Brechin, and the sheriff of the county of Forfar for the time, *ex officio*.

4. The two members of the town council of the burgh of Montrose to be elected by the town council of the said burgh shall be so elected upon the day appointed for the election of magistrates of the said burgh by the Acts of Parliament for the time subsisting and in force for such election in the month of November one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, and in the month of November in every year thereafter, and shall hold office for the year ensuing such election.

5. The nine persons to be elected municipal trustees by the municipal electors of the burgh of Montrose shall be municipal electors and merchants or shipowners, and shall be elected by the municipal electors in the manner prescribed by the Acts of Parliament subsisting and in force for the election of town councillors of the burgh of Montrose, on the first Tuesday of November one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight; and on the first Tuesday of November one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, and in every succeeding year, one third of the nine municipal trustees shall go out of office; and in the said year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine the one third who shall go out shall consist of the municipal trustees who had the smallest number of votes in the present year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight; and in the succeeding year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, the one third of the municipal trustees first elected under this Order who shall go out of office shall consist of the municipal trustees who at such first election under this Order had the next smallest number of votes (the majority of the trustees in a stated or special meeting always determining where the votes for any such municipal trustees shall have been equal who shall be the persons to retire), and thereafter the one third of the municipal trustees so

A.D. 1878. annually going out of office shall always consist of the municipal trustees who have been longest in office: Provided that any municipal trustee so going out of office shall be capable of being immediately re-elected: Provided also, that no person who is a member of the town council of the said burgh shall be capable of being elected a municipal trustee, and that in case any such trustee shall become a member of the said town council, he shall cease to be qualified to act as a trustee, and shall thereby be held, ipso facto, to have resigned his office.

Same procedure as town councillors election.

6. The election of municipal trustees by the municipal voters of the burgh of Montrose shall proceed and be conducted as nearly as possible in the same manner as the election of councillors for the said burgh is for the time appointed to proceed and be conducted by the existing law.

Trustees to settle order of municipal trustees retiring.

7. Where two or more municipal trustees have been elected on the same day under the provisions of the Municipal Elections Amendment (Scotland) Act, 1870, or have been elected by an equality of votes under the provisions of the Election Acts, the majority of the trustees assembled in a stated or special meeting (including the municipal trustees so elected) shall determine the order in which the municipal trustees so elected shall go out of office.

Election of county trustees.

8. The five persons to be elected county trustees shall be so elected by and in the Michaelmas meeting of the county of Forfar, to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight; and such county trustees shall remain in office until the Michaelmas meeting of the said county next ensuing, and in like manner in every year thereafter the Michaelmas meeting of the said county shall elect five persons to be county trustees in the room of those going out of office under the provisions of this Order: Provided that no member of the town council of the burgh of Montrose, or of the city of Brechin, shall be capable of being a county trustee, and that no person shall be qualified to be elected by the said county as a trustee under this Order unless he be a commissioner of supply of the said county.

Election of Brechin trustees.

9. The four persons to be elected by the magistrates and town council of the city of Brechin shall be so elected upon the day appointed for the election of magistrates of the said city by the Acts of Parliament for the time subsisting and in force for such election in the month of November one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, and in the month of November in every year thereafter, and shall hold office for the year ensuing such election.

Officers to be continued.

10. The officers appointed by the trustees under the Harbour Acts shall continue to hold their offices during the terms of their respective appointments, or until they resign or are removed, and shall be subject to the provisions of the Harbour Acts and of this Order, and all bonds or securities granted for the conduct and intromissions of such officers shall be and remain valid, and may be enforced by the trustees to the same extent and effect as such bonds and securities might have been enforced by the trustees if the Act confirming this Order had not been passed; and in making appointments after the resignation or removal of the officers appointed under the Harbour Acts, the trustees may from time to time combine and consolidate, or may separate the offices.

Byelaws to remain in force till altered

11. The byelaws, rules, and regulations made under the authority of the Harbour Acts, or any of them, which are in force at the passing of the Act

confirming this Order, shall be the byelaws, rules, and regulations of the trustees, and shall continue in force until altered or recalled by the trustees. In regard to sales by the trustees authorised or required by the Harbour Acts, the trustees may direct such advertisements as they think necessary, and the provision as to advertising sales contained in section 51 of the Act of 1837 shall be and the same is hereby repealed, from and after the passing of the Act confirming this Order.

Advertisements on sales.

12. For the purpose of preventing any injury to navigation the trustees shall not commence or construct any quay, pier, wharf, or other work whatever below the line of high-water mark without the consent of the Board of Trade having been first obtained in writing under the hand of one of their secretaries or assistant secretaries, and shall not construct any such work otherwise than as may be approved of by the Board of Trade in writing as aforesaid; and where any such work shall have been constructed the trustees shall not at any time alter or extend the same without having first obtained the like consent or approval; and if any such work shall be commenced, completed, altered, or extended without such consent or approval having been first obtained, it shall be lawful for the Board of Trade, at the costs and charges of the trustees, to abate and remove the same and to restore the site thereof to its former condition, and the amount of such costs and charges shall constitute a debt due from the trustees to the Crown, and may be recovered accordingly.

Works below high-water mark not to be commenced without consent.

13. If any work or portion of a work constructed or to be constructed by the trustees in, under, over, through, or across any tidal water or navigable river, and which affects or may affect any such water or river or access thereto, shall be abandoned or suffered to fall into disuse or decay, it shall be lawful for the Board of Trade, at the costs and charges of the trustees, to abate and remove the same or any part thereof, and to restore the site thereof to its former condition, and the amount of such costs and charges shall constitute a debt due from the trustees to the Crown, and may be recovered accordingly.

Works affecting tidal waters, &c. abandoned may be removed at expense of the trustees.

14. It shall be lawful for the Board of Trade at any time, or from time to time as they may deem it expedient, to order a local survey and examination of any works of the trustees in, over, or affecting any tidal or navigable water or river, or of the intended site thereof, and the trustees shall defray all the costs of every such survey and examination, and the amount of such costs shall constitute a debt due from the trustees to the Crown, and may be recovered accordingly.

Local survey may be ordered by Board of Trade at expense of trustees.

15. At the expiration of one calendar month from the passing of the Act confirming this Order the several rates specified in the Schedules (A.) and (B.) to the Act of 1850 shall cease to be demanded or received by the trustees, and the several rates specified in the Schedules (A.) and (B.) to this Order shall, subject to the power of increasing or reducing the same herein contained, be levied and received in lieu thereof.

Repeal of existing rates and commencement of new rates.

16. After the expiration of one calendar month from the passing of the Act confirming this Order, and subject to the provisions of this Order and of Schedule (A.) to this Order, it shall be lawful for the trustees to levy on and in respect of all vessels entering or departing from the harbour the rates

A.D. 1878. specified in the said Schedule (A.); and all such rates shall be paid by the owner, agent, master, consignee, or other person in charge of such vessels.

Rates on goods.

17. After the expiration of one calendar month from the passing of the Act confirming this Order, and subject to the provisions of this Order and of Schedule (B.) to this Order, it shall be lawful for the trustees to levy on and in respect of all goods, animals, and things shipped, unshipped, or trans-shipped in the harbour, the rates specified in the said Schedule (B.); and all such rates shall be paid by the owner or consignee of such goods.

Power to increase or reduce rates.

18. The trustees may from time to time increase or reduce the rates and duties specified in the Schedules (A.) and (B.) to this Order, according to what may be required for the sinking fund, and the several purposes of the Harbour Acts and this Order; and with that view, at some stated or special meeting of the trustees to be held in the month of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, and in the month of August annually thereafter, the trustees shall fix and declare the increase (if any) to be levied, or reduction (if any) to be made upon such rates and duties specified in the said Schedules (A.) and (B.) for the year, to commence on the first day of October following, which increased or reduced rates and duties shall commence to be levied on the first day of October following any such meeting, and shall continue to be levied and paid from year to year, until otherwise expressly ordered by the trustees at any stated or special meeting to be held in the month of August as aforesaid; and notice of any resolution of the trustees authorising such increase or reduction shall within ten days after such resolution is adopted be given in at least one newspaper published in Montrose: Provided that the increase made in rates or duties shall not in any year exceed one-fourth part of the original rates or duties specified in the Schedules (A.) and (B.) to this Order in addition to such original rates or duties.

Power to compound for rates.

19. In addition to the powers of compounding for and varying rates contained in the Act of 1850 and in the Harbours, Docks, and Piers Clauses Act, 1847, the trustees may from time to time agree, for any time not exceeding one year, with the owners or masters of vessels engaged as regular packets or traders, or with any other persons using the harbour, for the payment of rates and duties less than the rates and duties which the trustees are authorised to levy under the Harbour Acts and this Order as a composition by the year, or such other shorter period, for such rates and duties: Provided that, besides the persons so compounding or agreeing, all other persons using or frequenting the harbour in the same or similar circumstances may compound for any rates or duties leviable from them under the Harbour Acts and this Order on the like terms as shall be contained in such agreement, and that no preference shall be given to any person.

Annual account to be sent to Board of Trade.

20. The trustees, within one month after sending to the sheriff clerk the copy of their annual account in abstract, shall send a copy of the same to the Board of Trade; and section 16 of the General Pier and Harbour Act, 1861, Amendment Act shall apply to and include any and every such account. If the trustees refuse or neglect to comply with this provision they shall for every such refusal or neglect be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

21. Fishing vessels belonging to countries with which for the time being treaties exist exempting from dues and port charges such vessels when forced by stress of weather to seek shelter in the ports or on the coasts of the United Kingdom, shall, when forced by stress of weather to make use of the harbour, and not breaking bulk while making use thereof, be exempt from rates leviable under this Order.

22. Officers of Customs, being in the execution of their duty, shall at all times have free ingress to and passage and egress on, along, through, and out of the harbour and works by land, and with their vessels and otherwise.

Custom House officers.

23. All persons going to or returning from any lifeboat or using any apparatus for saving life, and being persons either belonging to the crew of the lifeboat or to the coastguard, or being persons for the time being actually employed in saving life or in exercising or using the lifeboat, or the apparatus for saving life, and also all persons brought ashore from any vessel in distress, shall at all times have free ingress, passage, and egress to or along and from the harbour and works of the trustees.

Lifeboat crew.

24. The officers of the coastguard, and all other persons for the time being actually employed in connexion with the lifeboat or the apparatus for saving life, may either permanently or temporarily, and from time to time, attach or cause to be attached to any part of the pier spars and other apparatus for saving life, and may also, either in course of using or of exercising the apparatus for saving life, fire rockets over or in the harbour.

Life-saving apparatus may be attached to pier.

25. The trustees may from time to time build, purchase, contract for, or hire, and may maintain, use, and let steam tugs for the use and accommodation of vessels frequenting the harbour, and may also from time to time license such number of steam tugs or other towing vessels belonging to any person for such period and on such terms and conditions as they think fit: Provided always, that it shall not be lawful for any other person or persons without the license and authority of the trustees first applied for and obtained in writing, to use or employ any steam tug or other towing vessel within the said harbour, and every person offending against this provision shall forfeit and pay for each such offence any sum not exceeding ten pounds.

Trustees may provide and license steam tugs.

26. The trustees may from time to time fix and make such rates or charges as appear to them reasonable, for or in respect of the use of such steam tugs or other towing vessels maintained, belonging, used, or let or licensed by them, and such rates or charges shall be paid by the owner, agent, master, consignee, or other person having charge of the vessel obtaining the assistance of such steam tug or other towing vessel, to the trustees, or to their lessee, or to the person with whom they may contract, or to the owner of such steam tug or other towing vessel, if licensed by the trustees, as the case may be, and shall be due and payable whether such steam tug or other towing vessel shall be actually employed or not, provided the assistance thereof shall have been required, and shall in consequence of a requisition have been tendered by the master or other person having the command of such steam tug or other towing vessel.

Power to borrow money.

27. The trustees from time to time may borrow for the purposes of the harbour, on the security of the rates and duties and other revenues and property, other than light dues, payable and belonging to them in virtue of the Harbour Acts and this Order, any sum or sums of money not exceeding thirty thousand pounds, including the amount of the debt authorised by the Harbour Acts and due by the trustees at the passing of the Act confirming this Order.

Transfer and equal ranking of securities.

28. All moneys to be borrowed under the authority of this Order shall be secured, and such security may be transferred in the same manner and form as is directed by the Harbour Acts with respect to the money borrowed or to be borrowed under the authority thereof; and all the provisions of the Harbour Acts, so far as subsisting and in force with respect to the borrowing, and to the security, and to the transfer or assignment, and to the repayment of the sums thereby authorised to be borrowed, shall extend and apply to the moneys by this Order authorised to be borrowed; and the respective assignees, in security under assignments granted by the trustees under the authority of the Harbour Acts or either of them or of this Order, shall be entitled one with another to their respective proportions of the rates and duties, and other property comprised in such assignments respectively, according to the respective sums in such assignments mentioned to be advanced by such assignees respectively, and to be repaid the sums so advanced, with interest, without any preference one above another by reason of the priority of advancing such moneys, or of the dates of any such assignments respectively.

Debts charged on rates.

29. The rates and duties by this Order authorised shall be liable to and be charged with all the debts, claims, and demands whatsoever to which the rates and moneys leviable and payable under the Harbour Acts, or either of them, shall be subject and liable under the provisions thereof at the time of the passing of the Act confirming this Order; and all assignments or other securities granted under the authority of the Harbour Acts, or either of them, shall be as effectually charged upon the rates by this Order authorised as if such rates had been specifically and expressly conveyed and charged by such assignments or other securities.

Notice to be given to creditors before exercising borrowing powers.

30. The power of borrowing conferred by this Order shall not be exercised by the trustees until they shall have intimated their intention to exercise such power to the creditors holding mortgages or assignments for money borrowed or due by the trustees by notices in writing delivered personally to such creditors, or sent by post in registered letters to their respective addresses in the register of mortgages or assignments and transfers, in order that such creditors may, if they think fit, receive payment of the amount due to them respectively on such securities, within a time to be specified in such notices, nor until the trustees shall have paid the moneys required to be paid by any such creditor by an answer in writing left at the office of the clerk of the trustees within two months after the date of delivery or posting of such notices, and a certificate under the hands of any two justices of the peace of the county of Forfar that such notices have been given, and that the moneys so required to be paid have been paid, shall be sufficient evidence that the provisions of this section have been duly observed.

31. If after having borrowed any part of the money by this Order authorised to be borrowed, the trustees pay off the same, except by means of the sinking fund, it shall be lawful for them again to borrow the amount so paid off, and so from time to time.

32. All assignments to be granted by the trustees under the authority of the Harbour Acts or this Order, and all moneys to be advanced and lent on the security of the property and works of the trustees, and the rates authorised to be levied by them, shall be moveable or personal estate, and transmissible as such, and shall not be of the nature of heritable or real estate.

33. The trustees may accept and take from any bank or banking company in Scotland, credit on a cash account to be opened and kept with such bank or banking company in the name of the trustees, according to the usage of bankers in Scotland, to the extent of the sums which the trustees are by the Harbour Acts and this Order authorised to borrow, or any part thereof, and may assign the several rates leviable under this Order, other than light dues, in security of the payment of the amount of such credit, or of the sums advanced from time to time on such cash account, with interest thereon: Provided that the whole sum due and owing by the trustees on such cash account and for money borrowed by them on bonds, or other securities or vouchers of debt, shall never, when taken together, exceed the amount which they are authorised to borrow as aforesaid.

34. From and after the thirty-first day of May one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight the trustees shall annually set apart as a sinking fund, out of the rates and revenues other than light dues to be received by them under the authority of the Harbour Acts and this Order, a sum not less than three hundred pounds, and such sinking fund shall be applied by the trustees from time to time, and at least once in every three years, in paying off borrowed money and to no other purpose whatsoever.

35. The trustees shall annually deposit the sums directed by this Order to be set apart as a sinking fund in any bank in Scotland, having a branch or agency in Montrose and incorporated under Act of Parliament or Royal Charter, until such sinking fund shall be paid and applied in manner hereinbefore provided.

36. Every part of the money borrowed under this Order shall be applied only for the purposes authorised by the Harbour Acts and this Order.

37. Sections 16 to 19 inclusive and sections 25 and 26 of the Harbours, Docks, and Piers Clauses Act, 1847, shall not be incorporated with this Order; but the Undertakers shall at their own expense, when required by the Board of Trade, provide to the satisfaction of the Board of Trade a site near the harbour, and build on such site a house and other proper accommodation for a lifeboat, rocket apparatus, and other life-saving apparatus, and shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for every calendar month during which they omit to provide such accommodation after having been required so to do by the Board of Trade.

38. The lighthouses, lighting apparatus, lands, buildings, buoys, beacons, and other property, and all the rights and powers regarding the lighting and buoying of the harbour and the approaches and entrance thereto, acquired by the trustees under the Act of 1837, are and shall remain vested in the trustees; and are and shall remain part of their undertaking and be kept in repair and maintained by the trustees under the Harbour Acts and this Order, but subject to the provisions of this Order; and the trustees may, with the consent of the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses first obtained, establish other lighthouses and beacons in such convenient situations as they shall think proper for directing the safe approach to the said harbour, and under such regulations as they shall with such consent from time to time make and provide, and keep in repair and maintain the same in like manner.

Separate
account to be
kept of light
dues.

39. It shall be lawful to the trustees to levy and receive, on all ships, vessels, or other craft entering the said harbour, light dues of such amount as they shall annually fix and determine, not exceeding the amount specified in Schedule (C.) to this Order.

A separate account shall be kept by the trustees of the light dues received under this Order and the application thereof, and the trustees shall revise the same from time to time so that the income derived from such light dues may be as far as practicable sufficient and not more than sufficient to meet the expenditure of the trustees on lighthouses, beacons, and lighting apparatus connected with the harbour.

As to lights
after comple-
tion of works.

40. The trustees shall, at the outer extremity of the harbour and works, exhibit from sunset to sunrise such light or lights, if any, as shall from time to time be directed by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, and shall apply to those Commissioners for directions as to lighting, and the trustees shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for every calendar month during which they omit so to apply.

Saving rights
under the
Crown Lands
Act, 1866.

41. This Order shall not be taken as a consent to the surrender of any rights, interests, powers, authorities, or privileges transferred to the management of the Board of Trade by the Crown Lands Act, 1866, nor shall any works under this Order be commenced within the limits affected by any such rights, interests, powers, authorities, or privileges without the consent of the Board of Trade having been first obtained.

Costs of Order.

42. All costs, charges, and expenses of and incident to the preparation and obtaining of this Order, or otherwise incurred in reference thereto, shall be paid by the trustees.

All vessels with cargoes entering the harbour for safety or convenience, and not breaking bulk or taking goods on board except stores for ships use, to pay one half of tonnage dues only.

Any vessel remaining in harbour more than two calendar months to pay in advance one penny per register ton for every month or part of a month beyond such two months.

All goods shipped overside, or sent direct from one vessel to another for the purpose of being exported, to pay one half dues only ; but no goods landed and deposited in the sheds belonging to the trustees or remaining on the quays over-night shall be entitled to this exemption.

All goods having paid shore dues inwards shall be exempted from paying shore dues outwards if they be in the original state and in the original packages ; or if at the time when the goods are landed it be reported to the collector that they are imported for the purpose of being packed, press-packed, or cylindered, they shall be allowed to be exported free of dues within one month from the date of such report. Herrings imported to be cured, packed, and exported, and which shall have paid shore dues inwards, shall, on exportation, if such take place within four months of the date of importation, be exempted from all shore dues, provided it be reported to the collector at the time of their importation that they are imported for the purpose of being cured, packed, and exported.

All goods having paid shore dues outwards are exempted from dues when brought inwards if they be returned goods to the original shipper and in the original state.

All returned empty boxes, barrels, bags, sacks, and pack sheets are exempted from dues.

All goods not enumerated above to be charged by the trustees in proportion to other goods of similar bulk and value specified in the above schedule.

Five cubic feet, not exceeding two and a half hundredweight, to be rated a barrel bulk, but when the weight of five cubic feet is greater than two and a half hundredweight, then two and a half hundredweight to be rated a barrel bulk.

In weighing and measuring goods for ascertaining the shore dues payable, the weight or measurement of the package is to be included.
